When I was doing the research for the display I was deeply moved to read of the families - the wives and mothers, fathers and children who were bereaved. This poem speaks of the pain felt by a mother whose son has gone off to war.

The Mother

*If I should die, think only this of me:
That there's some corner of a foreign field
That is for ever England.* Rupert Brooke

If you should die, think only this of me
In that still quietness where is space for thought,
Where parting, loss and bloodshed shall not be,
And men may rest themselves and dream of nought:
That in some place a mystic mile away
One whom you loved has drained the bitter cup
Till there is nought to drink; has faced the day
Once more, and now, has raised the standard up.

And think, my son, with eyes grown clear and dry
She lives as though for ever in your sight,
Loving the things you loved, with heart aglow
For country, honour, truth, traditions high,
— Proud that you paid their price. (And if some night
Her heart should break — well, lad, you will not know.

May Herschel-Clarke lived between 1850 and 1950. She was an Englishwoman who, as far as we know, published only a single volume of poems. This was in 1917 and it is chiefly remembered for the two anti-war poems. The Mother was a direct response to Rupert Brooke's famous poem The Soldier.
