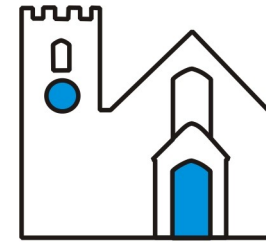

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Here are some more interesting snippets that I found when researching events in Hartshorne as reported in the newspapers of the day. I hope to put on a display for the Heritage Open Day on 12th September .

THE LEICESTER CHRONICLE.
SATURDAY, APRIL 16, 1864

ASHBY - A concert was given in the Bath Assembly Rooms, on the 4th inst., by the Hartshorne Church choir, assisted by a few friends in Ashby, the proceeds to be applied to the funds for building a Girl's School in the village of Hartshorne. The room was crowded by the numerous friends and admirers of the worthy rector's wife and daughter, Mrs. and Miss Buckley, who took the principal solos and leading parts in choruses. The performance was very good for a village choir, which was supported by the gratuitous assistance rendered by the Ivanhoe Musical Society.

HARTSHORNE

The Rev. H. W. Buckley, rector of Hartshorne, has been compelled by failing health (produced by 42 years' laborious service as a parish priest) to resign his Rural Deanery into the hands of the Bishop of the diocese. The Rev. H. W. Buckley was one of the first rural deans appointed after their institution under Bishop Butler, in or about the year 1837, and Mr. Buckley consequently the oldest rural dean in the diocese of Lichfield. No one (so long as his health permitted), could have been more indefatigable or energetic in the performance of his duties. The state of the schools in his own parish, both as to the number of pupils and their efficiency, speaks for itself, as regards the late rural dean's capacity for organising instruction and conveying it. His daily personal attendance at one or both schools was unfailing during many years, the instruction of the young having always been a branch of the ministerial office to which he was peculiarly attached. Within the last two years, a girls' new school has been built at Hartshorne; the late lamented Lord Chesterfield having kindly given a site for the purpose, in value from £12 to £15. The cost of the building, has been defrayed by voluntary subscription from Sir John Crewe, the Rev.

H. Buckley, Messrs. Rat cliff and Thompson, of £10 each; and of £5 each from Messrs. Brunt, Biddulph, Mansfield, Mellor, Startin; a large collection of upwards of £30 by the kind exertions of the respected churchwarden, Mr Ratcliff, and many smaller, but equally liberal sums given by the tradesmen, farmers, and cottagers, of Hartshorne. A large sum was also raised by choir concerts; the choir, which is justly celebrated, having been instructed and led by the late dean's talented wife and daughter. The present capacious building has a house for the mistress attached, and upwards of 100 female children receive daily and Sabbath instruction there – the girls' school having hitherto been supported for 31 years by the rector of the parish, at his sole and unassisted expense, with the exception of a sermon (rarely of late) at intervals of great length. In adverting to Mr. Buckley's resignation of his office of rural dean, we are happy to bring forward the good deeds and zealous care of his flock (above all that most important of it the young), for which he is so respected by all classes, and we are sure all will unite in the hearty wish that he may speedily be restored to health, and that the milder climate of the south, to which his medical advisers have ordered him to repair, may prove curative as well as beneficial for the moment.
