

Friends, it's so important, and at the heart of our Gospel, that we engage with the world around us - our wider communities outside of 'church'. So here's my thoughts on this...

I'm not sure what we call this new age, but it can't correctly be called post—Christendom anymore. We're beyond that.

Increasingly I come across professionals in the public and private sectors, members of the public and many teenagers (in my daily chaplaincy role in secondary schools) who couldn't tell you what the word 'Christendom' even refers to.I , let alone what post-Christendom might refer to.

As just one practical example of this - If I don't have the Lord's Prayer printed in orders of service at funerals most people won't know it to join in when asked.


People aren't rejecting that tradition or us. That's not it. It's just that too many just haven't a clue about what the church is anymore. So, the growing challenge is the growing gap between the institution of the 'come to us' church and the wider community that has little collective memory of who we are or what we do or - perhaps more importantly - why we even exist.

Now, for decades there have been prophetic voices within the Church calling for us to stop pretending to be the 'host' who had any right or claim to say 'come' & take seriously the commandment to 'go' by becoming the guest at another's 'table', at their invitation. We've mainly ignored these prophetic voices as we have remained, stubbornly, as a 'come to us' institution.

The greatest mission based theologian of the 20th century, (David Bosch. See: "Transforming Mission: Paradigm Shifts in Theology of Mission 1991") tells us that "we're not the 'blessed' or the 'haves' standing over the 'damned' or those who 'have not'". He further explains that the great commandment to 'go' is one of humility that leads us into the holy space of the 'other' - because there is literally no-where that the Holy Spirit is not already working and not already in every location and space in the world.

Why the long theological preamble?

Simple - if we don't get our theology right, we will never get our practice right. It's all got to start with our understanding of who God is and what kind of people He calls us to be.



So... Engagement with the world, in my personal and ministerial experience, works best in this era when we 'go' as a guest into the wider community and, putting on the 'apron' of service and of modern 'foot washing', we decide to serve all the diverse folk we meet in that age-old diaconal chaplaincy role. Chaplaincy, often misunderstood, is when we regularly serve the same group of people in their workplace or in the wider community in love and kindness.

Chaplaincy is a role many can play (lay and ordained) as it simply takes a willingness to listen, love and serve but equally important to stay, to remain. However, and here's a serious warning, it's a very very very long term commitment. It asks for depth, time, commitment, and a willingness to stick with it.

As a guest, in the role of a chaplain, in another's space it can take years to gain people's trust and to be allowed into their personal space as they begin to share of themselves and seek support. As a secondary school chaplain I daily serve in whatever ways needed. How has this looked? Here are just a few examples:

- I've been on the front gate welcoming pupils to school at 820am;
- I've shoveled snow to keep the place open, I've helped staff in personal difficulties,
- I've mentored teenage lads at risk of exclusion,
- I've wandered around at lunchtimes and, quite rightly, been ignored by everyone.
- I just try to serve as a guest in another's space.

The work of the diaconal ministry of Chaplaincy, for all Christians everywhere whether lay or ordained, is to serve in such a way as to ensure that love is not in word or talk only, but in also in deed and in truth (see: 1 John 3:17-18).

### The Archdeacon writes...

**'It was horrible'**, has been my stock answer to anyone asking a question about my night sleeping rough as part of the annual YMCA Sleep Easy event.

Which is not to say that the company and mutual support of the 91 people gathered (which from' Team Derby Diocese' included myself, my eight-year-old daughter, the Bishop of Derby and her son, and Revd Michael Futers from the cathedral) was not supportive.



But let's not kid about, a night away from warm cosy beds, sleeping both on and under cardboard boxes in cold weather was not pleasant. And I was only sleeping rough for one night, in an organised event, a safe place, and with a security guard ensuring our safety.

At several points of an uncomfortable night, the recognition came that we were doing this for one night, there were many in communities across the diocese, especially our city and larger towns where people sleep rough or sofa-surf.

Especially traumatising are the numbers of children in temporary accommodation for prolonged periods.

The biblical imperative of protecting the vulnerable and oppressed is strong and clear (Proverbs 19:17, Lev 25:36, Matt 25:34ff). The Gospel verse which comes to mind whenever I reflect on homelessness is Jesus' own assertion that animals have a home but that he [Jesus] has no accommodation (Matt 8:20).

In fact, Jesus in the Gospels was dependent on the hospitality and welcome of others to meet his needs.

Housing Justice, a Christian charity advocating for safe and affordable housing provision for everyone, refers to all having safe, affordable accommodation within a community where they can access work and alongside others in the community and flourish in their lives.

The indignity of being homeless or in overcrowded temporary accommodation is an affront to the innate dignity we all share as children of God.

The Diocese of Derby is holding onto its vision of the Kingdom of God: Good News for all.

The Bishop's Leadership Team has discerned four missional objectives to realise that vision. Challenging Injustice in our diocese is one of those core objectives and working, where possible, to develop safe, affordable, secure housing on available church land is one of the streams of work we will develop.

As of March 2023, in Derby there were 8-12 people sleeping rough each night, there were 2,086 homeless applications for housing, and there were 20 families in B&Bs for over six weeks. All these figures were and are rising. All these figures relate to real people who bear the image of God.

Those who slept out or raised funds for those sleeping out to raise awareness of homelessness raised a staggering £29,000 towards challenging the injustice of homelessness in our communities.

Please do continue to pray and collaborate in the effort to ensure that everyone in our diocese has safe, affordable and secure accommodation for their household.




# St Marys, Coton in the Elms

## Growing faith and developing ministry


Our exciting, easy-to-access training is available for all who want to deepen their faith, grow in discipleship and develop the gifts God has given them in the service of the church.

The training is open to all who want to learn more about their faith and also to those who want to develop in ministry.

You don't need any formal qualifications to take any of the modules, just some good thinking and reflecting skills.

You can work towards a Certificate of Mission & Ministry by completing the whole course with assignments or you can simply do the modules for your own faith journey.

You can do one module or many, and you can start, stop for a while and then pick up again later.



The training is modular, which simply means that you will spend 10 sessions looking at a particular subject (for example, the Bible or Pastoral Care or Mission and Evangelism etc).

These 10 sessions make up one module.

You will do seven of these sessions on your own in the comfort of your own home at a time to suit you and the other three sessions will be done on Zoom.

#### For Those who Would Like to Complete a Full Course

The Diocesan Certificate in Mission and Ministry (CMM) Course:

As noted above, the course is designed to help you growth in your faith and the develop the ministry to which God has called you at this time and place in your life. This is now all online and can be completed from the comfort of your own home. The course is modular and each module consists of seven sessions which you complete on your own and three which you complete with other students on Study Days via Zoom.

### For Those who Think They May Be Called to Licensed Lay (Reader) Ministry

Do you think God may be calling to be a Licensed Lay Minister (Reader)? If so you may want to sign up to the new LLM (R) training course. The first year of the new course starts in January and is now a discernment year which you can take while working with a vocations adviser and the supervision of your incumbent.

This gives you the opportunity to explore whether Reader ministry is for you. You will need the support of your incumbent (or the equivalent in a vacancy) in order to sign up for this course.
